The late Mr. A Gower M.B.E.

By the death of Mr. Gower in September 1968 it was not only the Society that sustained a serious loss. Mr. Gower was a leading and well-loved figure in the District: he was for many years Headmaster of St. Giles School at South Mimms and for several years a member of the Potters Bar Urban District Council, of which he became Chairman, and was active in his Parish Church and the National Savings movement.

In October 1960 he was elected Chairman of our Society at an awkward time early in its history, and held this office until he retired in April 1967, when he became a Vice-President. His death is keenly felt by the Society, and most of all those who served under him on the Committee have a sense of personal loss, for his was no ordinary personality. Above all he was kind, gentle and wise, and in an age when the Christian virtues he embodied are not always found in men of affairs, he lived up to his faith and quietly set an example.

The Society sent a floral tribute and was represented at St. Giles Church by Mrs Frost, our former Secretary, and Mr. Davis, Chairman.

The late Mrs.Jackson.

We also record with regret the recent death of Mrs. Jackson, of Oakmere Lane. She will be missed as a regular attender of our meeting for several years, and one of the small band who persevered at the High Street excavations in 1964.

Report on P.B.H.S. excavations in Potters Bar High Street in 1964.

At last the long promised report is in sight. As the stalwarts who toiled at "Tilbury's" will remember, the most important discovery was a large quantity of mid-seventeenth century pottery, building material and clay pipes thrown into an abandoned brick well. At that time surprisingly little was known about pottery of the period, but John Ashdown (Hon. Treasurer of the Post-Mediaeval Ceramics Research Group) volunteered to undertake this vital part of the Report. Since then so much has been coming to light on the subject that it was thought wise to wait until the study was more advanced before writing this section. Now John Ashdown says that his report is drafted – 3,000 words, plus photographs and drawings. This should be a useful document for Archaeologists far from Potters Bar, and we should produce it worthily. We have accumulated some reserve funds, and someone has offered help so we hope the full Report will appear before long.

Aims of the Society.

Our scope includes not only the history, archaeology and monument of the District, but the wider field of History in all its branches and periods, especially (but not so exclusively) in Britain. History lies behind everything we see and do – houses, churches, public buildings, factories, communications, equipment; our language and place names; our arts, institutions, traditions, occupations, technology; and above all our ideas.

We welcome all who are interested in these things, especially those who are prepared to be really active. With more resources we could attempt more e.g. excavations and publications.
