Another suggestion was that The Lion public house might be converted, or that it could be re-erected on the Wyllyotts' site, thus allowing a roundabout to be built at the Southgate Road/Mutton Lane junction.

to support the above proposals.

Laurel Lodge, were called Mandeville or Dancers Hill. There was Mandeville's Hill and an inn called Mandeville or Green Dragon. Is there a connection with Geoffrey de Mandeville, who gained South Mimms as part of the Manor of Edmonton at the Domesday Survey nine hundred years ago? Come and find out.



'The Human Touch at an Industrial School' by Mrs G Gear Church Farm Industrial School, East Barnet, was established in 1860 as a sult of an Act of Parliament in 1857. It was limited to

result of an Act of Parliament in 1857. It was linked to a home in the Euston Road, which late moved to Regent's Park Road. Church Farm was the country home where the boys were trained in country crafts. Most of the boys were without homes and had come from the streets of London.
