The Cinema - its early history in Potters Bar.

The earliest reference I have found was in February I920, when it was proposed that St.Mary's Church Hall was to be opened as a picture house, on Mondays and Saturdays for the next three weeks. The star programmes included "Mother Love" (from Rudyard Kipling's "Mother of Mine"), with the programmes changing on Saturdays. The doors opened at 7.00 pm. the films commenced at 7.30 pm.

Further reference to the Church minutes might provide additional information, as to whether the film shows continued longer than three weeks. However, St. Mary's Hall was to be used for a further film show in December 1922, on a Saturday evening, but it was postponed owing to the meagre attendance.

Major W.J.King, who was the prime mover in the development of Potters Bar into a residential suburb, presented plans in December 1924 for the widening and making-up of Billy Lows Lane. This was referred back, though he did gain approval for twenty houses in the road, subject to the construction of the sewers. Two years later (1926) he submitted plans for a new cinema in the Great North Road, backing on Billy Lows Lane, to seat four hundred people. It was deferred because it infringed the building line.

In September 1928, a far more ambitious proposal was made by Captain Tempest Keeping, for a British film-producing to establish a film studio on the Oakmere estate. It was to be built at the rear of the old St.John's Church (War Memorial site today) and adjacent to the land where Messrs. Sainsbury Ltd. proposed to develop shops and other buildings. Two large studios, each about 300ft. in length were to be built. It was necessary to proceed without delay, as from after April 1929 British films had to be produced in this country.

The South Mimms Rural District Council (SMRDC) considered the application and the town's planning expert, Mr. Louis Carr, saw no objection to the town-planning scheme being amended from open space in order to grant the film company's plan. Cllrs.

Tilbury and Shillitoe disapproved, as it would spoil the Oakmere estate, so the plan was refused. That was not the end of the matter, as the Potters Bar Ratepayers Association discussed the matter and passed a resolution for the Council to reconsider their decision.

At the SMRDC meeting in October Capt. Keeping was allowed to speak but it was felt the Ministry of Health would not sanction another open space if the planning application was approved. Therefore Cllrs. J.Gerken (chairman), C.H.Knifton, H.Shillitoe and H.W.Tilbury saved Potters Bar from becoming the centre of a local film industry.

In January 1932, approval was given for the erection of a 'New Cinema' designed by Major W.J.King, an architect and enthusiast for large, grand cinemas, on land owned by Major Diamond at the corner of Darkes Lane and Billy Lows Lane. However, revised plans were approved on the 25th January 1933; then in December an application for a cinema in Darkes Lane by Little Heath Estates was approved by the Council. I know nothing more of this, whether it involved Majors King and Diamond is not evident and one can find nothing more about it. The final plans of the two men were approved on the 3Ist January 1934 and the imposing cinema was opened on the 8th October and to the general public the next day.

'The Early History of Television' by Arnold Lynch.

The system of television as we know it was developed (except for colour) in the period I925-I936. It was Baird who first demonstrated television publicly, and it was he who used political influence to force the BBC to broadcast 30-line television from Brookmans Park. By I936 improved systems were being developed both by Baird's company and, in secrecy, by an almost anonymous team in the EMI company. When the two systems were compared publicly in broadcasts from Alexandra Palace, the EMI system was by far the better. The only remnant of Baird's system still in use is the word "television".

INFORMATION REQUIRED - DENHAM FAMILY

For several years I have been trying to trace the origins of the origins of the above family on behalf of a lady in Germany whose ancestor, James Denham, lived at Deephams Farm, Edmonton, in the I830s.
