19th August 1893

"On Saturday the ninety-four miles between Coventry and London were covered by the old stage coach 'Perseverance', at an average speed of eight miles per hour. Horses were changed at the Railway Hotel, Church End."

Page 19 New Roman column points to an identity crisis for Potters Bar by David Brooks

Mr Brooks came to the Museum and was given the Fact Sheet No.1 which refers to the origin of the name Potters Bar.

In the published article he states, "Brian Warren refuses to believe a link with Roman pottery could survive some 1100 years to 1387, the earliest known reference to Potters Bar. But others, including at least one fellow member of the local historical society, suspect it could date back to the Roman remains" i.e. Parkfield Roman 1st/2nd century kiln.

Perhaps the use of the words, "refuses to believe" is a little unfortunate because if one has studied local history for a long time one knows unless there is irrefutable evidence one always qualifies a statement. In this case perhaps a better terminology would have been, "regards it as being very unlikely".

Over recent years there has been a growing amount of information about the Roman occupation in this area, particularly in the 1st and 2nd centuries, as is the case in other areas.

From the presumed departure of the Romans to 1387 represents about 1000 years. Apart from archaeological evidence there survives no evidence of the Roman occupation in this area. There does survive place-name evidence for the Saxon period, which can be traced through to the Tythe Map. A recent survey by myself of the modern field-names shows that almost all those on the Tythe Map, 1842, have vanished, and that is only 150 years.

Little is known of the area until at Domesday (1086 AD) when reference was made to Mimes berewick of the Manor of Edmonton, no mention of Potters Bar. Such documents as have survived to cover the period from 1086 to 1387 make no mention of Potters Bar. In particular, the deed of 1220 which conveyed an assart (a clearing in the waste) near the present bus garage, to the Prior Canons of Cathale, gave the buttings and boundings as, 'lying between the land of Peter Hunilade and the land of Adam the forester by Enfield Chase' (Cass, South Mimms p15-16). Between the assart and Enfield Chase was the road from Waltham to Barnet, which is known to have existed at that time. As the bus garage site is so near to the medieval site of Potters Bar (Morven grounds) one might have expected a reference such as 'the way to Potters Bar', if it had existed.

It is possible that the first part of Potters Bar might be derived from the family of Geoffrey le Potter, who lived in the parish of South Mimms (not Potters Bar) in 1294. This might suggest the name of Potters Bar was established between 1294 and 1387 along with the settlement. I would very much like to be the person to discover an earlier reference to Potters Bar than 1387.

Meanwhile, if the other member of the Society might state their case, it could appear in the next Newsletter.

'Eleanor Coade - A Georgian Business Woman' by Miss Alison Kelly.

Eleanor Coade invented what was essentially an alternative to natural stone. Her work was immensely successful and employed by every eminent architect of the Georgian period. Her work can be found at such important buildings as Buckingham Palace, St. George's Chapel at Windsor and the Royal Naval College, Greenwich.

Coade stone is a type of clay, which when mixed with other ingredients, is kiln fired at great heat, transforming it into stoneware.

Alison Kelly has been a lecturer for over twenty years for London University and the author of a number of books. 'Tree Rings from the London Area - What they can tell us' by Dr Ian Tyers.

Dr Ian Tyers is another speaker from the Museum of London, who has been persuaded to come and speak to the Society. His subject was given as one of last year's lectures to the London and Middlesex Archaeological Society, at the Museum of London.



Following the lecture by Mr Ruttledge on the family firm in May, twelve members went on a guided tour of the Hertford Brewery. Not only was the lecture both informative and amusing but the tour was a great success.


"Thursday 2nd June 1994

Visits to see manufacturing processes are usually fascinating and this was no exception. Founded in 1827 by Peter McMullen, the company is still family owned. The old brewery built in 1891 dominates the site. Large fermenting tanks made of oak and lined with copper have been used for over 100 years and create a nostalgic atmosphere. A new brewery was built in the 1980's to increase capacity and brew lager. A total contrast here with gleaming stainless steel tanks, vats and huge ovens. We followed the brewing process from the start through many different critical stages - to the finish. We saw the ingredients - malt, maize, hops, sugar and yeast and heard about the 3 water wells - deeper into the ground than Nelson's column. We saw bottles filled and labelled at 28,000 an hour and much more. Tasting the products and a quick look round the Museum suitably ended a delightful experience."
