

The above picture shows the entrance to Parkfield Park with the magnificent Cedar of Lebanon on the left. In more recent times one of its boughs was torn off by a ferocious gale. On the right is one of the blocks of Parkside flats, the left one, which is not shown on the picture, is on the site of the former Parkfield house, which was demolished in the mid-1930's.

#### THE REPORT OF THE 38TH AGM

Ms. J. Foster, the Chairman, welcomed Members to the meeting, and informed those present that negotiations were still in hand concerning a possible relocation of the Museum. Monthly meetings concerning the Museum had been held with the council representatives, and an application for provisional registration was well under way.

Mr. J. Donovan presented the Secretary's report on the past year, noting that in spite of a small committee, the Society has made useful progress. Members had received three Newsletters and a Journal, which had been distributed by a faithful band of Members. The Friends of Bushey Museum had made contact with the Society and the Committee had visited the Museum. The National Trust was supplied with two volunteer observers, to act as site monitors for Morven Park, and they had sent in the first annual report.

Of the greatest significance during the year, was the purchase of a new Canon 6216 photocopier, which will enable the Society to print its own publications at a significant saving in the cost of production. The acting-Treasurer, Mr. J. Donovan, gave a brief summary of factors affecting the accounts., which showed a significantly reduced balance carried forward, due to the purchase of the above photocopier.

#### **MUSEUM NEWS**

The forthcoming exhibition, commencing on Tuesday 1st July, is entitled, "The Motor Bus in and around Potters Bar." Our Society member, Ron Kingdom, has provided many of the illustrations and for this we are grateful to him. Several of the other exhibitions will be changed at the same time.

In accordance with the Service Level Agreement between Hertsmere Borough Council and the Society, the first annual report ending 31st March was submitted to the Council.

During the year the Museum was opened 161 times with an attendance of 1,991 visitors. Two exhibitions were displayed - "Photographic Views in and around Potters Bar (1930-1950)" and "Leisure in Potters Bar from 1897." Both proved to be of great interest to our visitors, as can be seen from the 256 entries in the Visitors' Book.

Visits were made by local schools, and other educational establishments were provided with information.

In addition, the Archivist dealt with 26 general enquiries, 10 family history, 10 identification of objects, 8 school topics, 5 'A' level projects, 5 history of properties and the provision of copies of photographs. The second batch of local War Memorial recordings was sent to the Imperial War Museum.

Grateful thanks are expressed Messrs.. D. Green, T. Goulding, B. Kolbert and D. Lore for organising the rotas and to those who have acted as voluntary stewards.

#### SUMMER LECTURE PROGRAMME


<u>Tuesday May 27th.</u> "Queen Eleanor and the Crosses Erected in Her Memory.", by Mr. Jack Edwards.

#### **ROMAN COIN HOARD**

In July 1995 a local metal detectorist, with the permission of the local landowner, discovered a Roman coin hoard of 65 denarii at Potters Bar. A further number of coins belonging to the same hoard was found during the summer of 1996. Dating from the reign of Claudius (AD41-54) to that of Commodus (AD177-192), most of the coins are in remarkably good condition.

The fact that the coins represent a continuous succession of Emperors means that this coin hoard was accumulated over several decades, probably by one person. This find adds to the previously known Roman activity in the area.

Mill Green Museum has acquired this exciting hoard, for which it has had to provide a sophisticated security-cabinet, and plans to display the coins in the near future.

#### POTTERS BAR - BIRTHPLACE OF AN EDWARDIAN PARACHUTIST

This year, 1997, marks the 200th anniversary of the first successful human parachute jump - by a Frenchman, Andre-Jacques Garnerin, from a balloon over Paris. His fifth jump was made over London from where Selfridges stands today.

But what, you ask, has this to do with Potters Bar? Garnerin was the first of many parachute pioneers, one of whom, many years on in the 1880s, was born in this town and became a renowned Edwardian parachutist. Her name was Dolly Shepherd, who made many hazardous balloon ascents and parachute descents over Alexander Palace and numerous other pleasure venues in Britain. No harness and reserve parachute for her, just a wooden trapeze bar to grip with her hands and a webbing "sling" between her legs to help take the weight of her body.

Recently, while revising and updating my history of the parachute, "The Big Umbrella", first published in 1973 and due to re-appear this summer, I re-read Dolly's autobiography "When the 'Chute Went Up". Potters Bar was given as her birthplace in the first paragraph, but not the specific location. Dolly died many years ago, so I got in touch with her daughter, Molly Sedgwick, whom I had first met 23 years ago, and who obligingly sought out Dolly's birth certificate. This stated that she was in 1886 in Hawthorne Villas in Potters Bar . All Molly could recall was that Dolly had told her she remembered hearses passing by on their way to the cemetery.

In Mutton Lane then, near Potters Bar cemetery? But this cemetery did not exist in 1880s. However there was another cemetery at hand - a few hundred yards away up the road at St. John's Church, now demolished, in the High Street. So where was Hawthorne Villas? It was our Society's archivist, Brian Warren, who helpfully located them for me. These houses, a block of four semi-detacheds, appear on maps showing the development of the east side of the Barnet Road between the Lion public house and the Baptist Chapel 1911-1935 (see PBHS Occasional Papers. No. 6, 'The Barnet Road', by G.L.Field).

The villas were numbered 1 to 4 (32-38 Barnet Road). The number of Dolly's house is unknown. They were demolished in 1971, and made way for the Toc H hall and the small car-park owned by Hertsmere Council, at the southern end of the parade of shops.

The Shepherd family did not stay long in Potters Bar. They left after a year or two and took up residence at No 15 Station Road, New Southgate - a happy choice for Dolly, for there in the middle distance, hugging the skyline, was the hulk of Alexandra Palace, where she was launched on her parachuting career, which she pursued between 1904 and 1912.

In my book I had described a hazardous, nearly fatal double descent from a balloon in 1908, made by Dolly in the Midlands, near Uttoxeter, in Staffordshire, in company with a younger woman. Although Dolly broke her back, she was determined to survive - and did. From scant information I had when writing my book, I assumed Dolly had died. But not at all. After publication, I received a letter from Molly, telling me Dolly was alive and well and living in Eastbourne. "Do come and visit her," she said. I seized the chance, and spent two or three hours with Dolly and Molly, listening enthralled to Dolly's reminiscences and looking through her photographs.

Dolly died in 1983 - only just two months before her 97th birthday. Her life had been busy, fulfilling and rich in excitement. Her autobiography, published in 1983, has recently been revised by her daughter - a thrilling saga, but one that ended with a surprising abruptness.

During her eight years of parachuting, Dolly made scores of parachute descents. Then, one day in 1912, while in mid-air, she heard an inner voice. Its message was clear: she must never make another parachute drop. If she disobeyed, she was told, she would die. Dolly obeyed, and never took to the skies again.

There is an unusual memorial to Dolly at "Ally Pally". Near the Great Hall is a mural depicting scenes from the Palace's life, and among them, in a familiar pose, is Dolly Shepherd, in her neat uniform of peaked cap, knickerbocker suit and boots, the trappings of a parachute queen of a bygone age.

I feel honoured to have met a woman with such panache and such courage. Potters Bar should be proud, too, that such a woman occupies a place in its history.

#### There was a Crooked Man

There was a crooked man Who walked a crooked mile. He found a crooked sixpence Against a crooked stile. He bought a crooked cat, Which caught a crooked mouse, And they all lived together in a little crooked house.

This rhyme commemorates the bloodless battle of Duns (1639), during the Scottish Bishops' War, and the "crooked man" in question was Sir Alexander Leslie (c.1580-1661), later 1st Earl of Leven and Lord Balgonie (1641). It was as Lord General of the Army of the Covenant fighting against the Church reforms of King Charles I that he marched, or "walked a crooked mile," from Edinburgh to the Scottish border, or the "crooked stile." There he met King Charles I, who was also known as the "crooked sixpence" due to his constant lack of money to pay his troops. The Scottish Army was the "crooked cat." Although the rhyme states that the cat caught the "crooked mouse," there was no true battle and both armies went their separate ways - and lived together in a "little crooked house," or Britain. They did not live together in peace for long, however, for only three years later both armies were again at odds in the English Civil War. We are indebted to Stuart G.C.
