

COVER PICTURE

This is the eighth in the series of black and white photographs of Potters Bar, taken between 1969 and 1972, by Mr. E. Bartlett, a former Secretary of the Society.



In 1721 William Swain was granted a piece of land abutting onto the King's Highway, at the Williotts Manor Court, and in 1740 a messuage was erected by William and Mary Stone. In 1751 it was a licensed premises called *The Robin Hood*, a name it retained for much of its time as a public house. The exceptions were 1760-61, *The Robin Hood and Damsel*; 1768-1811, *The Robin Hood and Little John*; and 1928-34, *The Old Robin Hood*. Following war damage in 1940, it was rebuilt and finally closed in 1980 to make way for M.F.I. (which has, itself, now transferred to the Friern Park Retail premises).

REPORT OF THE 39TH AGM

Ms. J. Foster, the Chairman, welcomed members to the meeting, and informed those present that the Museum is now well on its way to being Registered (after which we shall be able to apply to English Heritage for National Lottery funding!). We are actually still looking for new premises for the Museum but we have, meanwhile, received a 7-year guarantee of tenure at Wyllyotts. We are also considering the suggestion that the Society should become a Trust.

Mr. J. Donovan presented the Secretary's report on the past year, noting that members had received three Newsletters and a Journal, which had been distributed by a faithful band of members. The Society had sent Reports to the National Trust and to the Imperial War Museum. Jean Smedley is cataloguing the Museum's archaeological depositions. The membership stood at 198.

The acting-Treasurer, Mr. J. Donovan, presented the accounts which showed a small increase over last year's balance carried forward, due to savings made in the production of our publications since the acquisition of a new photocopier.

MUSEUM NEWS

Just a reminder to members that the present exhibition is entitled "More Photographic Views in and around Potters Bar", and will end on the 30th June 1998. This will be followed by "Barnet Fair Through the Ages". It is hoped that all members will take the opportunity to visit these exhibitions.

For those members who have not been to the Museum in recent months, there are now two small exhibitions; the information for the first one, on railways, was provided by Gordon Eve, and the second one, on local bricks, by Terry Goulding. This latter exhibition includes examples from before and after the brick Tax of 1784, bricks with the maker's personal stamp on, specialised bricks and ones from local sites.

In the near future it is hoped to replace the exhibition on dolls with one on various types of horseshoes, and feature, on the Recorder Board, information on local Coal Tax Markers from information collected by John Donovan.
