

COVER PICTURE

This is the eleventh in the series of black and white photographs of Potters Bar, taken between 1969 and 1972, by Mr. E. Bartlett, a former Secretary of the Society.



The first Baptist Chapel was opened in the Barnet Road, on December 2nd 1789. When that building became defective the then pastor, Richard Ware, raised enough money to purchase an extra plot of land, in July 1868. The foundation stone was laid by the pastor on the 2nd August, the same year. The above chapel was completed and opened for public worship on January 7th, 1869; it is now the Ware Hall.

REPORT OF THE 40TH AGM

MUSEUM NEWS

We have been asked by members to explain the significance of 'Registration' for our Museum. Julie Massey has given us the following information.

The Registration Scheme for Museums and Galleries was introduced in 1988 as a way of ensuring minimum standards by measuring performances against accepted professional standards. It provides an assessment of quality and accountability, and encourages all Museums and Galleries to achieve (at least) minimum standards in management, care of collections, and public services. Furthermore, it fosters confidence in the competence of Museums and Galleries.

Benefits to Registered Museums and Galleries include public recognition that they meet approved standards (fostering confidence among potential donors of objects), and eligibility for Museum and Gallery Commission and Area Museum Council grant aid and subsidised services.

Registration is also taken into account by a wide variety of other bodies such as the National Heritage Memorial Fund and the National Lottery Fund.
